

LECHLADE HISTORY SOCIETY

In February, LHS member Bill King spoke to us in his usual informative and entertaining style about 'The Fascinating Story of the Bicycle' from the earliest models to modern racing and mountain bikes, and the sociological impact of this means of transport. Although there is possibly a representation of a bicycle in 15th century drawings from Leonardo Da Vinci's workshop, the first two-wheeled 'running machine' or velocipede was developed in Germany in the early 19th century. This was a wooden construction propelled by the rider's feet as it had no pedals.

Throughout the 19th century the machines were improved, some having more than two wheels and able to accommodate three or four people. At first there were no brakes and cyclists were advised to steer into a hedge if they wished to stop! There were many innovations in the 1880s and 1890s when pedals and rubber tyres were introduced, steering and braking mechanisms improved and lighter construction materials were developed. The 'safety' bicycle featured equal-sized wheels – a great improvement from the contrasting wheel sizes of the unstable penny farthing!

Once designs had been modified so that long skirts did not get entangled in the wheels, the bicycle gave women more independence. People could travel further for employment, grocers and butchers offered home delivery services, the army replaced horses with cycle battalions for reconnaissance operations, and the postal service used bicycles for deliveries. Many elements of car construction were first used for bicycles and car manufacturers such as Hillman and Morris started their businesses by making bicycles.

Our March meeting was a talk about 'The Oxford of Inspector Morse' by Alastair Lack. He explored the characters of Morse, Lewis and Endeavour and highlighted some of the locations in and around Oxford which appeared in the series. Some scenes were shot at locations near the production studios in west London so that the crew had no need to stay overnight in Oxford. Many of the main actors and production team did however sometimes stay at The Randolph, now home to the famous Morse Bar.

Oxford pubs did of course play an important part. Morse and Lewis would discuss their murder enquiries over a pint or two and this was a clever device to help the audience consider what were usually quite complex plots and clues devised by Colin Dexter, the author of the Inspector Morse books. The many references to literature and classical music in the series reflected Colin Dexter's and John Thaw's own interests. The two main characters in each series – Morse and Lewis, Lewis and Hathaway, Endeavour and Thursday – were 'chalk and cheese' in their characters, backgrounds and approaches to crime-solving.

The 'Twilight of the Gods episode in 1993 attracted an audience of 19 million, about a third of the British population at the time.

NEWS FROM ST. LAWRENCE

The season of Lent comes before the great celebration of Easter in the Christian Church. It is a time of reflection, repentance and renewing our focus on Christ. Traditionally, it is a time of abstinence, of giving something up, whether it be alcohol, chocolate, or something else we rather enjoy. More and more, however, Christians are seeing it as a time of taking something up, of doing something different to help us in our following of the Christian way. Some decide on some good spiritual reading; others join a discussion group. It is about growing in our understanding and seeing how that makes a positive impact in our daily lives.

Every year St. Lawrence puts on a Lent Course which gathers together local people into groups to go through a shared course looking at a particular topic or theme. This year the course was called 'Whole Life Worship', seeing how we can worship God in every aspect of our lives, not just when we meet together on a Sunday for a service in a church. One of the criticisms often levelled at the Church is hypocrisy – we say one thing but do another. In some cases, it is a fair observation, but in many cases it is unwarranted. The Lent Course this year was very helpful in helping us make connections between what we do on Sundays (pray, sing, hear God's Word etc.) and what we do Monday-Saturday. Does our faith make a difference in how we treat people, how we use our time? Does it change our motives, our priorities? Being part of a church focussed on spiritual growth and living an authentic life before others is hugely important and Lent becomes an important time to re centre ourselves.

How else do church members serve God and serve others? Many contribute regularly towards the Food Bank, helping those who use the services of the Swindon Food Collective. Others play leading roles in the Gardening Club, the Art Society, local choirs, music groups and sports teams. Others volunteer as a school governor or help in Lechlade Community Library. Church members also offer their time to the Chaplaincy team at the Great Western Hospital, the Patient Transport Service of the Friends of Fairford and Lechlade Communities, the Tuesday Club, Working for Wellbeing and numerous other charities and worthy causes in the local community. It is all testament to the fact that Jesus urges us to be 'salt and light' in the places where we find ourselves. It is about making a difference, not being a holy huddle, insulated and isolated from the world outside.

As we move from Lent through Easter, we journey from the darkness of the Cross to the light of the Empty Tomb. From the horror of Good Friday to the joy of Easter day. We worship a God who came to us in human form, choosing to dwell with his Creation. We also worship Jesus Christ the Son of God who showed us the way of self-sacrifice and serving others. I am so grateful that in St. Lawrence Church we can see many people following in the way of Christ and giving of their time, money, and talents. They are truly Easter People. Two months ago we shared with you our plans to refurbish the library. In the last Bridge we asked for your help. In this article we give you our heartfelt thanks for your response and encouragement.

The team have been very busy developing plans and exploring funding sources. In addition to the grants we announced last time, we are pleased and grateful to announce a National Lottery grant of £20,000. Lechlade Town Council have been particularly supportive with advice and a grant of £10,000. Thank you also to the Clementson Trust for their £1,000 donation. We are also hopeful of shortly being able to announce a grant from Cotswold District Council.

Even more inspiring has been the tremendous response from the community. A big thank you to the many local businesses who have contributed some amazing prizes to our raffle. Hopefully you will win the chance to be pampered, thrilled or entertained. The draw will be made by Ella Bacon and Christine Eatwell, Lechlade Deputy Mayor.

We all know that Lechlade is a special place. We have received help and support from many organisations and individuals. Thank you so much for the help, information, encouragement and donations.

Many of you will have heard of the efforts made by 10 year old Ella Bacon, a pupil at St. Lawrence Primary School. A regular library user, on seeing our call for help, she set up, with her mother's help, her own Just Giving fundraising campaign with a readathon. She succeeded in raising £1060 for the library. Chris Roberts, MBE, who has been helping us with media coverage, publicised this with the local media. This led to Ella being recognized for community service on the "Ant and Dec Saturday Night Takeaway". Thank you and congratulations Ella.



We are getting close to our target now and are starting to make decisions on subcontractors. We are currently on target for the refurbishment to happen in October after the busy summer months. We will keep you informed on our progress.

We also received some good news on the operational side. You may be aware that we also have some challenges with increasing costs, mainly due to increased energy and utility costs. Lechlade Town Council agreed to support us with a £1,000 grant to help mitigate potential losses. Last week, with the assistance of County Councillor Dom Morris, Gloucestershire County Council announced a discretionary grant of £2,000 for this year to Lechlade Library and each of the other Gloucestershire community libraries.

These initiatives are highly appreciated by Lechlade Library. Together with other cost cutting measures taken this enables us to cover this year's anticipated losses.

LECHLADE MEMORIAL HALL AND PAVILION

Watch out. The Pirates are coming to Lechlade. The swashbuckling ones from Penzance! We have wonderful facilities for putting on live performances and we are very keen to make full use of these facilities for the benefit of the local community.

Thanks to a very generous donation from Lechlade and District Lions, we will shortly be able to replace the bench on the playing field which is adjacent to the All Weather Pitch. The new bench will be the same design as the ones recently purchased by the WI and installed at the entrance to Lodersfield. We are very grateful to the Lechlade and District Lions for this donation.

We have two new activities which are designed to get local people to become more active. "Take a Seat" has already started in the pavilion on Wednesday mornings. On Friday 5 April "You can Move" are starting weekly sessions on the All Weather Pitch. This is a free, all inclusive outdoor movement class funded by Cotswold District Council. We also have a new activity "Baby and Me" which starts on 30 April. This provides postnatal support for new parents. Further information about these activities is available online or you can contact our bookings clerk (details below) for more details. If you know anyone who may benefit from any of these classes, please let them know that they are available.

On **Thursday 4 April**, World Jungle have organised a "**Go Wild**" event on the Playing Field. This is a free event for children/young people. Activities include; Circus Skills, Graffiti Art, Giant Bubbles, African Drumming and Crafts. For further information and to book a place, please see posters on noticeboards or online.

We have started work on making more efficient use of our storage facilities in the Pavilion with the aim of restoring the committee room (currently used as an extra store room) to a usable space.

When the pavilion was the only community building during the Memorial Hall rebuild period, we purchased 100 foldable chairs. We have now transferred 40 chairs to a separate store room leaving 60 for use in the pavilion. More chairs can be provided on request. Our next steps are to replace the very heavy 3 row storage trolley with a lighter, more manoeuvrable 2 row trolley which can more easily be moved into the main room. We have also purchased 3 of the smaller sized tables to go into the pavilion so that the three larger tables (which match those in the Memorial Hall) can be moved across to the hall. Having consistent sized tables will help with minimising storage area for these tables.

We are always delighted to host family events/parties. With the Pavilion, Memorial Hall main room and Memorial Hall social room there is a range of options available. GLOUCESTERSHIRE MENTORING PROGRAMME

This time, we're giving you an exclusive sneak peek at some key findings from our external evaluation. We had an impact on 269 girls and young women considered at risk of criminal involvement, helping 235 through mentoring relationships and 47 through pre-engagement support, including telephone mentoring. They mostly fell into the 12 to 16 age range. - 47% of these young people have experienced social services involvement, either before or during their journey with the Programme. - 94% of mentees found mentoring useful.

GMP mentoring is making a positive impact on how mentees feel about themselves, with outcomes in three domains: embracing healthier coping mechanisms; making more positive decisions; and forming positive relationships. The role modelling and opportunities provided by our mentors helped make these achievements possible.

ALL OUR YESTERDAYS Chudleigh's Drapery



This photograph, featuring two likely looking Lechlade chaps, was taken in the early part of the 20th century from the top of St Lawrence church tower. But it's the shop behind them that we are focusing on for this edition's helping of local history.

This was 'Chudleigh's' drapery and there's quite a saga to tell of the Chudleigh family. A Clement Chudleigh arrived in Penzance from the Scilly Isles, with his eight children, and opened a drapery shop. In 1906 they sold up and moved to Swindon, opening a similar shop in Faringdon Road. An early advertisement showcases the 'Latest Novelties in Millinery' and the 'Newest styles in Mantles & Jackets – they obviously wanted to be seen as trend setters! In about 1910, one son, George, having completed an apprenticeship at 'Spooners' of Plymouth, came to Lechlade and set up the drapery in the photograph. He was 21 years of age so clearly an enterprising and ambitious young man.

In The Parish Magazine of June 1913, George is recorded as playing cricket for Lechlade, scoring 25 runs. A later reference shows him continuing with his batting prowess, scoring another 25 runs in a match against Williamstrip in June 1914. The last reference to George in the magazine is the announcement of his marriage to Marion Spearman Lee, sister of Jack Lee and daughter of the landlord of The Crown pub, on 24 November 1915.

He seems to have given up the shop, quite possibly due to war service, and moved to Swindon. But in 1921/22 he returned and opened a new drapery on the corner of High Street and Thames Street (the current premises of The Care Net). The business may not have prospered because he sold it to his wife's brother, Jack. You can see from the photograph below that Jack clearly made a go of it and, in addition to drapery, branched out into camping equipment. This may have been prompted by the fact that what is now 'Bridge House' camp site was already in existence in the inter war years. My father used to come down from Highworth for weekends with his mates away from their mothers' possibly disapproving gaze!



George went to live in Sherborne Street at 'The Laurels', where his daughter opened a hairdressers. During WWII, George was a corporal in The Upper Thames Patrol (UTP) section of the Home Guard. They guarded the river around Lechlade, often patrolling between the Red Lion (now Monique's Country Kitchen) in Lechlade and The Trout. UTP was sometimes aptly mis-interpreted as 'Up The Pub'!

Moving by Jenny Éclair

Edwina Spinner, now well in her 70s, used to live a busy life with her first husband, who sadly died young, then her second, who had a somewhat problematical son. She had her own complicated children, twins, a boy and girl, both very different with different hangups. But above all she was an artist and illustrator and ended up doing the artwork for a series of children's books. She lives alone in a large family house in London and decides it's high time she moved - but oh, the clutter!

So far so good. It then became a series of chapters of reminiscences by people from her past. Some were rather unpleasant and seemed to degenerate into using a lot of swear words.

If I am honest, I did not enjoy this book. I picked it up from a charity shop, mainly for the author. I wondered what her writing was like. I won't bother again.

Morville Hours by Katherine Swift

A beautifully written book - part gardening, part history, part geography and wholly philosophical. She has a beautiful way with words.

In 1988 Katherine, who had been an antiquarian librarian in Oxford and Dublin, and her husband took on the tenancy of the Dower House, attached to Morville Hall, a National Trust property on the road between Bridgnorth and Much Wenlock in eastern Shropshire. When they took on the house there was not much garden but Katherine has made it her project to develop one. She managed to take on an adjacent field which she proceeded to divide into 'rooms' and set it out, with the appropriate planting, on medieval lines. She talks of her inspiration for planting and goes into the geography and history of the area around Morville.

As a child Katherine had some contact with the Roman Catholic Church when her mother briefly became a member. The book is set out as per the Hours of Devine Office - Vigils, Lauds etc. Each one corresponding to a month of the year.

I picked up this book from a charity shop, mainly because I know the area it is set in. I haven't finished it yet – there is a lot to absorb. But I will. It's a fascinating read and a real must for gardeners.

MATT FIDDES MARTIAL ARTS

The truth about 'free childcare'

15 March 2023. Jeremy Hunt ends his budget with a huge childcare announcement that will affect millions of people across the country. "So today I announce that in eligible households where all adults are working at least 16 hours, we will introduce 30 hours of free childcare not just for 3 and 4 year-olds, but for every single child over the age of 9 months." For thousands of parents this was welcome news, but for providers it came with a multitude of questions and concerns.

There is no denying that the expansion of the free childcare offer will provide many more families with affordable childcare, but there continues to be an ongoing Issue for childcare providers. This issue is funding, or lack of funding. Since 2018, the hourly funding rate has increased by 24%. This sounds significant, but when the National Minimum Wage in that same time has increased by 33%, then the gap begins to widen.

As well as the Increasing staffing costs, running costs are also continuing to increase. The reality is that the funding we receive Is not sufficient to cover our costs and therefore we are working at a loss. 'Free childcare' simply doesn't exist.

The ongoing, chronic underfunding from the government is having a detrimental effect on so many settings. Ofsted reports that registered providers have been steadily falling since 2016. Between August 2022 and August 2023, 3,320 (5%) providers closed their doors - resulting in early years places being down 17,800.* With continued low funding rates, it's clear that more providers will be closing their doors unless there is a significant change. And with every closure, fewer children are receiving early education.

With the new funding in place we will go from being 75% funded children to almost 100%. This means we will rely solely on government funding. We have to cut costs without compromising the children's early education and care - but also ensure our hardworking staff team get the appreciation and pay they so rightly deserve.

Lechlade Little Learners has been part of the local area for over 50 years. We have seen hundreds of children learn, develop and create lasting friendships. We are an Integral part of Lechlade life and we will fight to remain here.

ST LAWRENCE CHURCH CHOIR From Christmas to Easter

LECHLADE REPAIR CAFÉ

On the 10 February 2024, the Lechlade Repair Café completed its second successful year of serving our community.

Over the past year we have accepted 130 household items and appliances for repair. Over 80 differing types, shapes and sizes of everything imaginable that we use in our daily lives.

Most interesting are the appliances that have a long history attached to them, personal meaning, family memorabilia of significant age. These have included: A 55 year old Roberts transistor radio, which was a 16th birthday present from the lady's parents. An 80 year old 2 foot long, all metal, GEC electric fire lighter belonging to a lady, 93 years young, with its original motor, heart element and wiring; bringing it back into a working condition was very rewarding and a recognition of a bygone era when 'things' where made to last, reliable and serviceable. A 65 year old 'hot' bulb, all metal, slide projector. And in December we saw a 60 year old food 'hot-tray'. It is now back in service with a lovely lady as it had a very personal meaning having belonged to her parents.

We also saw some more unusual items: A bouncy castle air blower. A dog trainer which literally fired 30 tennis balls automatically; unfortunately it didn't train the dog to bring the tennis balls back - that's down to the owner! A device for converting 'cassette tapes' into a digital format for storage. A European dancing Christmas decoration. Darts electronic score board. And a 'Monkey' lamp to name just a few.

For those who like statistics, here is a summary of the accepted repairs for the past year:

130 items accepted for repair

102 successful repairs

78% - our average repair success rate (UK average is 68%)

400.2kg total weight of items saved from going to landfill

Using a proven equivalence calculator, we made a total 'Carbon Dioxide Emissions' savings of 3,762.82 kg CO2. (3.76 metric tonnes)

Or saving the equivalent carbon emissions of ONE of the following:

Driving 15,556 miles. Showering 2,341 times or Flying 22,841 air miles.

A big thank you to all of the customers that used the Lechlade Repair Café throughout the last year. And a very special "thank you" to our small group of dedicated volunteer repairers, who, without their commitment and support, I would not be able to run the Repair Café each month for the past two years.

Please keep your items for repair coming in. Without your support and generous donations we can't keep the Repair Café running. We look forward to seeing you at the next Lechlade Repair Café, 13 April 2024

It's been a busy start to the year for Lechlade Town Council (LTC) as we progress our many projects and set out our plans budgeted for, for the next financial year.

Town Councillor Vacancies

Lechlade Town Council is formed of 13 members. Unfortunately, there are currently 5 vacancies in the role of Town Councillor to be filled through the co-option process. The vacancies lead to an increased workload on the Clerks and remaining Councillors to deliver our ambitious projects for improving Lechlade.

Annual Town Meeting

The Annual Town Meeting will take place in the Memorial Hall **at 6:30pm on Tuesday 21 May.** This is an opportunity for the Council to present an overview of its work and achievements since the previous meeting and for community organisations to report on their activities over the year. All residents are welcome.

Traffic Calming

A community (Speedwatch) camera funded by the GCC Community Speed Watch Initiative has recently been installed on Burford Road. Data is collected on vehicles exceeding the 30mph speed limit and the ten highest recorded speeding vehicles are reported weekly to the Police, which leads to the Gloucestershire Police Road Safety team sending letters to the drivers. Furthermore, persistent offenders will be followed up by the Police.

Evidence from the 50 other community speed-watch cameras installed in Gloucestershire have shown that they are effective in reducing average traffic speeds by up to 25%.

Projects

LTC are pleased to be informed that they have been successful in their grant applications from the Rural England Prosperity Fund (REPF) administered by CDC toward upgrading the path from Wharf Lane to St John's Priory Park and the detailed design of proposed Multi-Use Path (MUP) from Downington to Fairford.

Resurfacing work by GCC Highways is due to start this month on the MUP section of the Thames and Severn Way from K9 dog kennels to Dudgrove Lane.

Work by GCC Highways is due to start in April on resurfacing the north side pavement in St John's Street. Residents in St John's Street will be contacted

by GCC Highways with details of the works programme and temporary restrictions they will cause.

Community Event

Save the date! A community event sponsored by LTC and the Memorial Hall Trustees, and led by Cllr Christine Eatwell, is planned for **Sunday 9 June** in the Memorial Hall. Representatives from the many local organisations and societies are being invited to inform residents of their activities and encourage active local participation.

GARDENING HINTS



Let's talk about the problems with box....

It is now extremely likely that you have seen box that's looking far from well, either because of box blight, now widespread, or because of the box caterpillar (Cydalima perspectalis). I was feeling very pleased because we seemed to have escaped both, but sadly not. Last summer was the first time that I could see signs of the caterpillar on our hedge, and two variegated box balls. Time to take action.

I've looked up the life cycle of the moth and during the winter the caterpillars hibernate deep within the recesses of the bushes (they are very difficult to spot at the best of times). Depending on the temperature they will start to pupate in March/April and hatch out into moths, which are nocturnal. The moths mate and lay eggs which hatch out into voraciously hungry caterpillars, and so the cycle starts again for at least two, maybe three generations in a year.

I'm loth to use a chemical spray so I'm trying the pheromone route which is a three pronged attack. Pheromones in the spring to attract the male moths so that they don't mate. Stage 2 is to get a parasitic wasp which will find any eggs that are laid. Once located, the Box Tree Moth eggs are parasitised and killed. The eggs then, instead of producing Box Tree Caterpillars, release new Trichogramma wasps to locate and kill more Box Tree Moth eggs! It is possible to move to Stage 3 if actual caterpillars are seen- there is a nematode for them too. Anyway that's the plan.

Because of this problem with box all the advice is NOT to plant in the first place, and Garden Centres are usually very helpful about suitable substitutes. The criteria to think about are that a substitute has to be green, evergreen and suitable for clipping.

Here are some suggestions from a good article in a March FT by Jane Owen called 'Think Outside Box', rather witty:

Number one:- Japanese Holly (ilex crenata). It looks very like box from a distance, but can get another disease called black root rot. A better one may be ilex Maximowicziana Kanehirae! Ilex Max for short (Phew)

Numbers two etc:- euonymous microphyllus, some pittosporum, lonicera nitida (a shrubby honeysuckle), osmanthus burkwoodii (good for topiary), phillyrea latifolia (green olive,'tough as old boots').... To name but a few. And, of course, my favourite, yew. Why not forget all these troubles and visit other gardens such as Rodmarton Manor, or Hidcote to see specimens of topiary and see how they are coping with the problem. Good luck.

MAX WINS GOLD IN THE COLD ICE SWIM

At the Winter Swimming World Cup held in Tallinn, Estonia, at the beginning of March, Max Rose from Lechlade not only won a gold medal, but also helped to set a new world record.

Max, who was helping to raise money for Cruse Bereavement Support, finished first in the Adduco Head Up 25m Breaststroke event. She said: "I'm still in shock! I actually won a gold medal today and became an international ICE swimming gold medallist – on International Women's Day of all days!"

Max took part in the world record attempt later that same day and was one of 807 people from different parts of the world plunging into icy water one after another and then swam 25 metres each. The previous world record was set in 2020 when 505 swimmers took part also in Tallinn.

The record attempt started on the evening of Friday 8 March at 6:00pm and the last swimmer finished early on the Saturday morning of 9 March at 1.14am! A goal of 1,000 winter swimmers had been set. However, this number was not reached, but 807 is still an impressive number and a new world record!

To take part in this challenge required a huge amount of training and money to cover travel costs, accommodation, kit and insurance, so Max has been trying to raise at least £3,500. The money is to be divided 50/50 between sponsoring Max's costs and donating to Cruse Bereavement. To date, she has raised £1,716. She had a very unhappy childhood because she was born out of wedlock and her mother rejected her. She lived with her grandmother who did not want her and at 13 went out to work. She met George who became her sweetheart. During the First World, he was a soldier in France and was there for five years. He sent Maud many postcards which were displayed, along with other interesting artefacts of the time. Maud and George were married in 1920 and one of the favourite items on show was the beautiful silk blouse that Maud had made, completely by hand, for her wedding day. Maud died in 1985 aged 91. UPPER THAMES AND RIDGEWAY NATIONAL TRUST ASSOCIATION

Andrew Beer, a former pupil of Warneford School and now the Director of Operations and Consultancy for the National Trust, started off the 2024 talks of the Upper Thames and Ridgeway National Trust Association (UTRNTA) in great style at Lechlade Memorial Hall on the 18 January. The hall was full of members and friends who learned a great deal about just how the National Trust works.

No funding is available from the government; membership fees and donations are the main source of income followed by entrance fees and income from cafes, NT shops and website sales. The 35,000 properties were gifted to the National Trust and, therefore, are unable to be sold, but at the same time incur considerable costs to maintain and conserve.

Andrew spoke about the need to look back, as well as forward when planning repairs, maintenance and conservation of properties, whilst also making them available for the public to continue to visit. There are changes being made to advance the use of websites and electronic information, thus saving costs on printed matter, such as the hand books and magazines.

The Trust values greatly its staff, which have a high percentage of younger people, and the many thousands of volunteers of all ages. Included in that number are some of our own members. There are now large numbers of families who are members of the National Trust in response to changes in attitudes and the provision of greater facilities.

Three projects were used to illustrate the challenges facing the Trust:

- The first concerned, land management and the conflict of interest in the Lake District: that is flood prevention, tourism, land management and its position in the National Park and as a UNESCO site. After much debate, a solution was reached to enable the tenant farmer to graze his cows on part of the site, and the river to be diverted to prevent flooding in its lower courses. An extra bonus is that otters moved in and wildlife flourished.
- The second was the decision to be made about Clandon Park, decimated by fire. Should it be restored, rebuilt or demolished? After wide consultation the decision has been made to partially restore it and to develop the remainder as a multipurpose site.
- Thirdly, he dealt with the subject of tree replacement and land management at the Sherborne estate. The types of trees to be planted must be suitable for the present environment and also for the future which we face with climate change.

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

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
