

WELCOME

Welcome to 2024 with some exciting news from The Bridge team. During 2024 we will be moving to professional printing for the paper magazine! Here's the full story:

As our regular readers will know, during the Covid pandemic we were forced to produce the magazine online. This was very well received so we have continued to publish free online even when we could produce a print edition again. Initially, print sales were limited to around thirty, but that number has grown steadily and we are now printing well over 100 copies per edition. Thank you to all our readers, long standing and new, for your support.

The online edition is in full colour with very clear text and images. Although we introduced a new in-house printing process for the black and white paper magazine, clarity is not as good as we would like. So, to achieve excellent clarity for text, images and advertisements and better manage the increased production run, we have taken the plunge and the April/May edition will be the first professionally printed Bridge magazine! Costs mean that it will still be black and white for the foreseeable future.

Professional printing will mean more paper copies for sale in Lechlade. As well as our usual sales outlets in the post office, Lechlade library and #NoLabels, we have recruited four more: Monique's Country Kitchen, Friends of Fairford & Lechlade Communities Charity shop, The Health Box and Cutler & Cashin. We would like to thank all of these for their support for the magazine and the Lechlade community.

Achieving a better-quality magazine will obviously increase production costs. The price of the magazine has not gone up since February 2004 although production costs have increased greatly. Therefore, we have had to take the decision to increase the cost of the magazine to £1. With no price increase for 20 years, the magazine has not been covering its production costs for some time. Also, people no longer carry much cash and many shops prefer electronic payment, meaning that paying, and receiving change, for items of less than £1 can be problematic.

We hope that you will support us as we strive to improve the quality of Lechlade's magazine and make it even more useful as a means of community communication by expanding readership.

The February/March edition always includes the new edition of The Lechlade Links and you will find the 2024 edition as a free insert in the paper magazine, online if you follow the links from the home of the online Bridge at <u>www.lechladebridge.org.uk</u> and as a separate free leaflet in Lechlade Library and St Lawrence church. The new year is often a time to think about trying something different by joining a new club or giving a new activity a try. The Lechlade Links includes most of the not-for-profit groups in our area. LECHLADE COMMUNITY LIBRARY Refurbishment News

Are you aware Lechlade Library has been a community run library since 2012? It is leased to the community by GCC, run by volunteers from the community and the interior of the library is the sole responsibility of the community, guided by a volunteer directorship. The result is a vibrant, successful community hub that offers not only library services, but also tourist information, council information and digital services as well as a warm space and a great social facility.

That there is a need for refurbishment has been known for some time. **WE NEED YOUR HELP TO ACHIEVE THIS!**

The last few months have allowed us to determine the issues to be addressed and to pursue several fundraising activities. Provided funding goals are met, the refurbishment will happen in October.

The refurbishment will address damp and cracking issues and improve our environmental footprint with new lighting, heating and secondary double glazing. There will be some structural changes, including a new reception desk (moved to the right of the entrance), a new display wall and seating area at the front. Also, new bookcases to increase book capacity, full redecoration and new flooring. The estimated cost is £78,000.

Through good financial management since 2012, we have accumulated a refurbishment fund of £20,000. We are grateful for additional donations and promises to date including Lechlade Parochial charities £1000, Lechlade on Thames Heritage and Development Fund £5000, Lord Faringdon Buscot Estates £2000 and SDM of Broughton Poggs - a 100% discount against the book removal and storage costs of £2850.

We have many grant applications pending including Lechlade Town Council, CDC SPF and CDC REPF funds and The National Lottery. We have received support and encouragement from Lakes by Yoo who are actively promoting us as their main charity in January.

Lechlade WI organized a pop-up café in January 2024 in support of the library. Crafty Boaters have kindly nominated the library as their charity to support in 2024. Lechlade Lions are discussing possible ways to help.

We are organizing a raffle draw between February and April to add to these funds. Fabulous prizes will be on offer with vouchers kindly donated for a flight in a glider, spa day with meal, brewery tour, trip to the circus, meal with wine, and a golfing day. More details will be posted on social media and posters in due course, when tickets will be available. We are excited about this project. We hope you are too. We are grateful for any support. We will be keeping the community informed as we progress.

As many of you will be aware, St Lawrence church is working on a reordering project, Project Inspire, that will not only address the essential maintenance issues in the church but rearrange the interior to make it more adaptable and better suited for the needs of the 21st century.

Part of this project envisages the multi-use of the Ringing Room. A majority of the St Lawrence ringing band feel that this is unsafe and unworkable as does the Gloucester and Bristol Diocesan Bells Advisor and many other experienced ringers from the Cirencester Branch.

The ringers have put their concerns to the church but this part of Project Inspire is currently still in the plan. Therefore, with deep regret, many of the current band have left St Lawrence to ring in other towers meaning that the remaining band is too small for viable ringing.

NEWS FROM ST. LAWRENCE

After the busyness of Advent and Christmas in the church, there is always a break- when most clergy have a holiday; when most people indulge in the biscuits and chocolate they have been given as gifts. But as January comes round we celebrate Epiphany, when we remember the magi coming from the east to worship the infant Jesus. There is much we do not know about the origins of the magi, but we do know that they represent the nations coming to worship Christ. This is not just a localised Middle Eastern religion, this is Good News for everyone. The compilers of the Book of Common Prayer therefore subtitled Epiphany as the 'Manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles.' It brings to fulfilment all those Old Testament prophecies of the Jerusalem temple becoming 'a house of prayer for all nations' (Isa 56:7). Christianity is now very much a global faith. Indeed, the real centre of the global Church is now in Africa, Asia and South America

In Lechlade we play our part in being part of the Global Church. Each year we commit ourselves to giving 10% of our income to world mission. Our World Church Group makes suggestions of how our giving is allocated and this year we are becoming an official partner church of SAT-7, a Christian organisation that uses the latest technology to broadcast into North Africa and the Middle East, places where it is often very difficult to openly be a Christian. These sorts of partnership are immensely important. They are signs that we take seriously the words of Jesus in the so-called Great Commission at the end of Matthew's Gospels. The magi were the start of that great spiritual movement. Do have a look at our Mission Partners bookmark at the back of church, or on the church website.

We are already thinking ahead to Lent and Easter. We will again hope to run the ever-popular Lent Course to deepen our faith and to share in fellowship and teaching with other local Christians. In an increasingly fractured and fragmented world, these opportunities for meeting and sharing together are so important. We will deliver a card with all our Easter services to every household in the parish.

We also encourage people to consider financial giving as part of their discipleship. It is always surprising and instructive to see just how many times Jesus talks about how we use our money in the Gospels and how the taking up and distribution of financial gifts is such a prominent feature of the letters in the New Testament. The start of the new year is always a good time to assess our giving and you may like to look at our Parish Giving Scheme, which is a really excellent way to give in an organised and tax-efficient way. All the details are in white folders at the back of the church. We are grateful to all those who manage our finances and we thank God for David Williams, who has recently stepped down from being our PCC Treasurer; we are in the process of prayerfully recruiting a new treasurer. LECHLADE HISTORY SOCIETY

History of Film

After our AGM in November, Patrick Furley gave us a very entertaining talk on the History of Film. He explained the evolution from static to moving images, the development of film projection and the motion-picture film industry, and the involvement of entrepreneurs such as Charles Pathé. He then used an early twentieth-century projector to show some hilarious old films featuring Mickey and Minnie Mouse and Popeye and Olive Oyl, which brought us great joy and much laughter.

Why Stonehenge had a Roof

English Heritage considers Stonehenge to be 'the most architecturally sophisticated surviving stone circle in the world', 'an engineering masterpiece' and most probably 'a prehistoric temple aligned with the sun's movements'. Intriguingly, Sarah Ewbank believes that Stonehenge was a temple, but was actually a two-storey building with a thatched roof, walls and doors, a gallery, a balcony, and a stone-tiled ground floor. She came to our meeting in January to offer her evidence for this fascinating idea and brought along a scale model that she had made of her proposed building to illustrate her theories.

She began her research in 2015 and, after studying various man-made features in the stones, concluded that the British in the Neolithic period had the engineering, woodworking and design skills to build a structure with a roof. She described the techniques that would have enabled wooden trusses to be hoisted into place to support the roof, opening and closing doors to be inserted in the walls, and other features to be constructed.

Why did the building need a roof? Sarah concluded that the structure they envisaged was to be so prestigious and significant that its creators wanted to be able to use it all year round, in all weathers and particularly at the winter solstice, so that several hundred people could gather indoors – therefore it would need a roof. She also wondered why the builders transported bluestones 150 miles from the Preseli hills in south-west Wales and sarsen stones from west Wiltshire. She believes that they would not have gone to all this effort unless the structure was to be covered with a roof.

Why has no evidence of a roof been found? Sarah thinks that the wooden and thatched parts of the building were destroyed by fire. There are no surviving layers of ash as evidence for this but Sarah suggested that this is because the floor was made of stone so any ash would have been washed away. Neither is there any evidence of a stone floor, but Sarah's view is that the stone would have been removed for use elsewhere.

Sarah, as a non-academic researcher, has encountered difficulties in persuading archaeologists and historians to study her theory about the design and construction of Stonehenge. She certainly made some plausible, perhaps even compelling, arguments but we were left wondering whether or not her ideas were credible. If she is right, then some of the accepted

views on Stonehenge as an open-air site will need revisiting. Linda Kent

CITIZENS ADVICE STROUD & COTSWOLD DISTRICT

I've built up a bit of debt and I am panicking. Even though I cut back, my spending has gone up and what I have coming in just doesn't stretch as far as it used to. What can I do?

The first step is to collect all the information you have about your debts, this might include contracts, bills and statements.

Next, make a list of your debts and write down the details of each. This could include who you owe money to, when you first missed a payment, and how much you now owe. You'll also need to make a note of your account or reference number and what steps the person or company has taken to get the money back, eg. sending you letters.

If you are behind on household bills, prioritise paying your rent or mortgage, plus energy bills and Council Tax first. Not paying these bills has the most serious consequences. You should speak to the person or company you owe money to, to see if there are any manageable steps you can take to start reducing your debt.

Once you've got these debts under control, you should look at any other debts like credit card or store card debts, payday loans or missed Buy Now Pay Later payments.

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A GOOD READ

Sleeper's Castle by Barbara Erskine

Alone and grieving for her partner of 10 years, Miranda (Andy) Dysart is dismayed when his estranged psychopathic wife turns up and hounds her out of the house. Rhona, the wife, erases every bit of Andy's presence, including her artwork - she's a painter and illustrator, even the will which left everything to Andy.

Alone and homeless, Andy jumps at the offer by a friend of the use, for a year, of her house in the Welsh Marches, providing she looks after it and more importantly, Culpepper, known as Pepper, the cat.

The house, Sleeper's Castle, dating way back before the1300s, is haunted by a father, Dafydd and his daughter, Catrin, both poets and musicians, who lived there around the early 1400s. Andy, highly susceptible to their presence, is drawn into the events surrounding the history of Owain Glyndwr as he tries to throw off the English yolk

Meanwhile the vindictive Rhona turns up at Sleeper's Castle, intent on trying to murder Andy - and anyone else who gets in her way. Between the two, Andy is pulled this way and that. She really only gets through with help from locals who know the history, in particular a psychic.

A good read which I found difficult to put down.

Legacy by Norah Roberts

Adrian Rizzio is the illegitimate daughter of Lina (of Italian extraction), a business woman who spends very little time with her daughter, offloading her on the motherly Mimi. Adrian met her birth father only once when he tried to kill her. He fights with Lina on the staircase and ends up falling to his death.

In her teens Adrian starts getting poems which seem to contain death threats. Initially they arrived on an annual basis. Over the years and after Adrian moves to her late grandparent's house in Maryland, the poems become more frequent and menacing. Then women all over the US are killed for no apparent reason. In the end the killer comes for Adrian Shan Garnell

The Book of English Place Names by Caroline Taggart

This was a birthday present chosen because of my love of local history. A wealth of large and small place names is covered although, typically, not every one you might choose to look up!

Lechlade is included – it says that the Old English word 'gelad' survives as 'lade' in place names and is normally interpreted as a 'difficult crossing'. The book suggests that the crossing at Lechlade was difficult because it was boggy but gives no indication as to why that is the supposition! It also does not suggest why the focus seems to be on the River Leach rather than the Thames! Cirencester and Burford are included but not Swindon! I'll leave it to you to find out what they mean.

VOLUNTEER MENTORS NEEDED FOR LOCAL YOUNG PEOPLE

Gloucestershire Mentoring Programme (GMP), a service that trains and supports volunteer mentors to work with young people, is looking to expand its pool of volunteers. If you'd like to find out more, you can visit their website at <u>www.gloucestershirementoringprogramme.co.uk</u> or contact them by phone (see below).

GMP is run by a collaboration of youth organisations and operates across Gloucestershire and South Gloucestershire. It offers free support to 10–25 year olds whose life circumstances suggest they're at risk of becoming involved in crime. These 'at risk' young people are given the chance to form a long-lasting relationship with a trusted adult (trained volunteer mentor). This is something that's often been missing in their lives and can be transformational.

What young people say: "We're very different. She's outgoing and that helps me with social anxiety", "It's great to have someone to talk to", "My mentor helps me get out of the house"

What volunteers say: "It is very satisfying supporting a young person, I learn from her and she learns from me.", "Volunteering gives me a purpose and a sense of achievement."

Anyone can become a mentor. You just need a heart for understanding and supporting young people and about an hour or so a week to spare.

ALL OUR YESTERDAYS

Young's garage, Lechlade

For this edition, I've chosen this business card, dating from the first part of the 20th century, from Lechlade History Society's archives.



The Lechlade Motor Works and Garage was established across two sites in the town. As you can see from the left hand image below, Frank Young's showroom and petrol pumps were on the High Street in the premises now occupied by The Cat's Pyjamas.

The photo on the business card was taken in his workshop, which was in a converted Malthouse at the bottom of Bell Lane. The Malthouse building is still there but it's been converted into homes as part of Tidford cottages. You can see the name on the roof in the right hand photograph below. The History Society have a record of the sale of this building at auction in the New Inn in August 1906. The auctioneers were Innocent & Son (yes that name lives on in Lechlade to this day). The sale notice mentions a long frontage to the Fee Wharf and the River Thames. Frank obviously thought he had bought the land between the malthouse and the river because, in 1930, there was a dispute between Frank and the Parish Council as to who actually owned the wharf area.





Mr Young was an enterprising businessman. As you can see from the business card, he not only provided the usual garage services but also

offered very fancy looking motors for hire so that you could explore the far flung charms of Fairford and Cirencester. A window into a bygone age!

But that wasn't all - in 1907 The Great Western Railway company recorded the sale of their last Clarkson steam bus to Frank Young for £350. He operated DA81 between Cirencester and Lechlade until at least 1911 when it was described as an 'ancient bus' and Frank stated that he hoped to put on a larger one in the near future. By 1914, there is evidence that he had replaced steam with petrol engines. An early timetable suggests that there were six buses there and back on weekdays with more services on a Thursday. There's no mention of weekends! Through the 1920s other bus companies got into the act running services not only to Cirencester but Faringdon as well.

GARDEN HINTS



During the recent heavy rain part of our garden wall fell down. This happens from time to time and we are philosophical about it- we have a lot of old walls and they do occasionally fall down. Luckily it is not in a place that is very visible, and we share the boundary wall with our neighbour. On his side the wall is stone and on our side it is brick. We don't know why. Anyway, the point of mentioning it here is because there is an itea shrub growing against the said wall on our side and to gain access to the wall for rebuilding it this shrub had to be drastically pruned. This is the kind of thing that you can't plan for in gardening. It is entirely the wrong time to prune an itea, but pruned it was, by about 95%, leaving six inches of one very low mature trunk with a couple of shoots on it. It may or may not recover, we shall see.

Pruning that can be done now is, of course, roses. We've just started and I'm erring on the hard pruning side rather than just deadheading them. I have to admit that when I am in certain friends' gardens, I am just itching to get my secateurs and loppers out when I look at their roses. Rose bushes full of very old stems, dead bits and lots of crossing branches. Cut those dead bits out, take one or two old branches right down to the ground, get rid of crossing branches and aim for a nice open bush, then give a nice feed. Even if the rose doesn't feel better then you will! Roses like a feed in Spring anyway and I have had Uncle Tom's Rose Tonic highly recommended to me, so I am giving it a try.

Great Dixter in Sussex is a wonderful garden and one that I admire greatly, not only because of the character and plantmanship of the late Christopher Lloyd, but also because all its aims and ethos chime with what I believe in and hold dear too. It is run entirely on organic principles and various scientific research projects have shown that this has resulted in a huge biodiversity of birds, animals and insects. They experiment and are not frightened of trying out new things. They like self seeders. They share their considerable knowledge.

It is a teaching garden- so every year they will take on a number of students who will live and work at Great Dixter learning as much as they can from Fergus Garrett, who now runs it, and his team. I have signed up for an online five part symposium and I shall be lapping up all that information and experience and trying to put it into practice here. You can also access video lectures that Fergus has given over the years from Vimeo. They cost £15 to rent, last about two hours and you have a month to watch them. If this appeals to you, Google Vimeo On Demand, in the menu choose Search and put in Great Dixter- all the titles should appear.

HEDGEHOGS



For many decades, I have been helping with the preservation of these fascinating animals and consequently met other helpers and organisations who have been only too willing to impart their experience and knowledge. Here are some of the very basic 'First Aid' guidelines that I have gathered which may be useful to you, giving you the confidence to care for a hedgehog (hog) for a day or two until you can either return it to the wild or transfer it to an animal rescue organisation:

- Hogs are night-time creatures. If you see one out and about during daylight hours, there is probably something wrong.
- What you are able to do will depend on the size of the hog and the nature of any injury or disease it may have. When you first come across a hog, try to take a few minutes to observe its behaviour.
- For protection, a large box with a suitable lid and ventilation will suffice. Comfort and warmth can be provided by several old towels, or similar, and you'll find that a hog will create its own nest. Maintenance of cleanliness is of paramount importance but hogs are not very adept at such matters so you'll need to "muck out" when required.
- Hogs need to drink a surprisingly large volume of water. Offer some water from a shallow dish but PLEASE don't offer milk as this is likely to cause stomach problems. Very young and small hogs will probably not be able to drink from a dish so it's useful to have a small pipette. If you don't have one, they can be found at vets, chemists and often in the pets' section at supermarkets. Wrap the hog in a suitable cloth and gently squeeze a drop or two of water into the corner of its mouth. With practice, for you and the hog, it will soon learn and you'll be surprised just how much they will drink! For food, I have found cat or dog food very acceptable and the sort that looks like pate can be used for very small hogs. I have also found that all adult hogs will always eat dried mealworms. PLEASE don't use bread as this, as with milk, can lead to stomach problems.
- Don't be surprised if you see a few ticks. They are small (1-3mm-ish), globular, grey parasitic creatures that feed on the blood of the hedgehog. In small numbers, ticks don't seem to cause hogs distress and inexperienced attempts to remove them using tweezers or other devices can lead to more serious problems such as infections.

There's plenty more that can be done to assist an ailing hedgehog. But that will require expert help from the likes of Animal Rescue Centres, Hedgehog Wardens, vets and the like. Don't wait too long to ask for help and advice and please remember that they are usually volunteers, so a donation will always be very welcome.

For any snowdrop enthusiasts (or galanthophiles) Chastleton has many different varieties including new cultivars that have hybridised from the originals. There's a snowdrop identification guide available too.

Looking ahead to **Easter**, there will be a **fun activity trail at White Horse Hill** over the Bank Holiday weekend with a chocolatey treat at the end for young ones. And Chastleton House will have a nature trail around the gardens.

SOURDOUGH REVOLUTION


Do you fancy learning how to make delicious sourdough bread? Well, this is your chance! Sourdough Revolution is now offering one day introductory courses!

LOCAL WILDLIFE AND NATURE

Christmas is now a warm but distant memory as we wrestle with a January full of weather extremes. Widespread flooding preceded brilliant sunshine and freezing temperatures, and now we seem to be facing winds of up to 60 mph on 20th and 21st Jan. Hold onto your hats!

In the middle of January, on a sunny walk around the some of the lakes north of Lechlade, I saw 3 **Red Crested Pochards** among a flock of black and white Canada Geese - 2 brightly coloured males and a more subtly shaded female (better suited to hiding on their waterside nests). For those reading this online, no description is necessary - just look at the photo below. For those of you reading the black and white paper copy, the male has a rounded golden orange head, red bill and black breast and tail; the flanks are white and the back brown, making it one of the most noticeable and unmistakeable of our local ducks. The female is mainly light brown with a darker head and back; the face is white.

Thinking they are far too colourful to be native ducks, I looked them up online (Wikipedia) and found that their main habitat spreads from Southern Europe, through the Black Sea area to central Asia and Mongolia. Our ones are mostly escapees from captive collections now breeding successfully in the wild but some may be visitors from the continent as the climate warms. In the UK they are most common in Gloucestershire, Oxfordshire and Northamptonshire.



It's interesting to note that you can just see the right eye of the male on the left. The position of their eyes means they can pretty much see behind them without turning their heads - a useful superpower for birds likely to be preyed upon. Other preyed-on birds, like pigeons, share this feature. This is a totally different eye position to birds of prey, with their forward facing eyes to give good binocular vision to focus on their prey; if they need to see behind them they have to turn their heads. You can see this clearly in the **Barn Owl** below.



You could see both of these birds if you keep an eye out on your walks

around Lechlade. The Red Crested Pochards can be seen on the local lakes and, although Barn Owls are mainly nocturnal, they do hunt in daylight when feeding their young, or after nights when it's been too wet to fly - you can see them pretty much anywhere in the countryside around local area.

Finally, for those reading this article early enough, don't forget the RRSPB Big Garden Birdwatch - 26-28 January. Google it for details.

ST LAWRENCE CHURCH CHOIR Christmas Preparation and Celebrations

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


